

It sure seems like the pause button has been eliminated from AZSFWC's daily activities and opportunities as we seemingly Zoom through a virtual reality. The year started fast and at least in the foreseeable future; it doesn't look like it will slow down anytime soon!

As February comes to a close, here is an update on some of what we've been working on.

<u>Wolves</u> – the Mexican wolf population count is underway. We commented on the Mexican wolf 10(j) Recovery Plan and the proposed alternatives offered by the USFWS as mandated by a ruling from the US District Court of Arizona. <u>Click here</u> to see that letter.

We also commented on the USFWS consideration to expand the Gray wolf territory into Northern Arizona. <u>Click here</u> to see that letter.

<u>Salt River Project (SRP)</u> – we had some dialog with SRP last fall about how we could partner with them on their watershed rehabilitation projects in Central Arizona. Those discussions have continued, and we are in the process of developing a Memo of Understanding with SRP for future collaboration. In the meantime, the AZ Deer Association was awarded a Stinson Grant to work with SRP on the Hardscrabble Project near Payson. Here is the Press Release: <u>https://bit.ly/3lidlxL</u>

<u>Cross F Ranch</u> – we awarded a Stinson Grant to the AZ Chapter of NWTF last year to help The Trust for Public Land acquire this ranch near Aravaipa. The acquisition opened access to 40,000 acres of public land that had been locked up for decades! <u>Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Travel Management</u> – the BLM is ramping up their Travel Management planning across Arizona over the next several years. There will be 18 different planning areas under consideration that will have an impact on a myriad of outdoor activities. Six of the areas will begin the planning process in 2022.

BLM Solar Planning – a number of solar plans are currently under consideration across Arizona. Variances have been sought near Maricopa, the Vulture City Ghost Town near Wickenburg, and another near Arlington. One can argue the importance of renewable energy, but we also need to consider the impact on our public land and wildlife. You can learn more about it here:

<u>Verde Recreation Action Plan</u> – the Prescott National Forest proposed this plan to improve recreation opportunities and natural resource conditions on the Verde Ranger District. The plan is intended to address both developed and dispersed camping, road and trail improvements, and river access to name a few. <u>Click here</u> to read our scoping comments.

<u>Draft Proposed Hunt Guidelines</u> – AZSFWC provided comments to the AZ Game & Fish Department (AZGFD) on their hunt guidelines process, supporting their use of the best available science in managing all of Arizona's wildlife, including game and non-game species and subscribing to the tenants of the North American Model of Wildlife Conservation. <u>Click here</u> for our comment letter.

<u>Legislation</u> – Federal level, efforts continue to keep the Tonto NF Cherry Creek and Workman Creek roads open. <u>Click here</u> to read our latest letter to Senator Kelly.

We are also monitoring H.R.2773 Recovering America's Wildlife Act (RAWA), which we have

We are also monitoring the following bills: SB1040, SB1066, SB1170, SB1377, HB2181, HB2610, HB2830, and HCR2024. <u>https://www.azleg.gov/#</u>

And if that wasn't enough for the first two months of the year;

- 1. Additional comments are due on 30x30 ATLAS in the first week of March,
- 2. We are reviewing feedback and input on Mandatory Reporting for AZ big game hunts,
- 3. Established a Conservation Bonus Point Committee to coordinate with AZGFD,
- 4. Assessing the access issue near the Needles Eye Wilderness area,
- 5. Investigating the proposed Oak Wells Windmill project 44K acres in Pinal County,
- 6. Reviewing the Draft EA for the Pinaleño FireScape Project on the Coronado NF,
- 7. Reviewing the US Air Force's proposed expansion of their Military Operations Area in

Arizona Sportsmen for Wildlife Conservation is a 501-c-3 not-for-profit organization whose mission is to educate and inform sportsmen, wildlife conservation organizations throughout the state and the public at large on important issues related to wildlife and wildlife habitat and to provide, via grants or other sources, funding to conserve Arizona's wildlife populations through habitat enhancement initiatives.



The AZSFWC is responsible for managing the conservation license plate program (L. Gary Stinson Grant Fund). The fund is derived from the sale of wildlife conservation license plates and member organizations as well as non-member organizations are eligible to apply for those funds.



By purchasing this plate you will be making a contribution to Arizona's wildlife and wildlife habitat. Seventeen dollars (\$17) of each twenty-five (\$25) special license fee will go to AZSFWC's L. Gary Stinson Grant Fund. AZSFWC will review and approve all grants from the special license plate program revenues. These grants will fund important outdoor recreational and educational opportunities and on-the-ground wildlife habitat restoration and enhancement projects. (More info <u>HERE</u>).

Once you have verified the availability of your personalization, or if you only want to order the AZSFWC Conservation Special Plate, click on "Order My Plate". Order your plate as a sequential shelf plate for \$25.00 per year or as a personalized plate for \$50.00 per year.
