OPEN PIPES ARE DEATH TRAPS!

You can prevent the needless deaths of birds and other wildlife.



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THESE DANGERS ARE ALL AROUND!

Often called “Death Pipes,” vertical, open pipes are a hazard on the landscape and can cause the gruesome death of birds and other wildlife that become trapped and perish within.



These pipes are often used as fence posts or to anchor a gate. They can also be used as sign posts, or to mark a boundary or a mining claim. Vent and irrigation pipes are also a danger if uncovered.



Bluebirds are the most likely victims, but many species are vulnerable to this threat.

COVER THOSE PIPES!

If you find open, vertical pipes on your property, cover them to prevent trapping birds, lizards, and other animals.

Here are several ways that you can eliminate this threat:



- Buy and install a pipe cap.
- Cover the top with cement to create a cap.
- If you need water or air flow, cover the opening with screen or ½-inch hardware cloth and secure with a pipe clamp.

Summarize Project Accomplishments:

We are grateful to have received partial funding for this project. It allowed us to begin this important work with the creation of an educational brochure and online resources. The brochure is an excellent tool to reach outdoorsmen groups via tabling events. We had great success talking with hunters at the recent Quail Fest as well as the general public at Southern Arizona Homebuilders Association well-attended outreach event. We also created an online reporting form that gathers information on location and size of the pipe as well as ownership of the land where it's located. So far we collected report of over 60 death pipes across Arizona. Most of these were temporarily capped to prevent future deaths in before we can cap them permanently.

The newly created online page (<https://tucsonaudubon.org/deathpipes>) on our website explains the issue and coaches the public on ways to prevent wildlife deaths by reporting and capping any open pipes on their properties.

We are eager to continue our work on this issue by conducting events to cap open pipes with volunteers and landowner constituents.
