PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, Arizona has a rich and storied tradition of hunting and angling, that dates back further than the state itself and carries forward to this day; and

WHEREAS, Arizona sportsmen and women were among the first conservationists to support the establishment of the Arizona Game and Fish Department to conserve fish, wildlife, and their habitat, and through their license fees helped fund state efforts to provide for healthy and sustainable natural resources; and

WHEREAS, the Arizona Game and Fish Department and an extensive network of partnering organizations are committed to mentoring our future conservationists through the recruitment, reactivation, and retention of hunters and anglers; and WHEREAS, upon realizing that license fees alone were insufficient to restore and sustain healthy fish and wildlife populations, sportsmen and women supported self-imposed excise taxes on hunting, fishing, and boating equipment to raise additional conservation funds; and

WHEREAS, to this day, the Arizona Game and Fish Department is funded primarily by sportsmen and women, through this American System of Conservation Funding - a "user pays – public benefits" approach that is widely recognized as the most successful model of fish and wildlife management in the world; and

WHEREAS, last year alone, Arizona's sportsmen and women generated \$59.44 million through this System to support the conservation efforts of the Arizona Game and Fish Department; and

WHEREAS, Arizona's 786,000 hunters and anglers support the state's economy through spending more than \$1.2 billion while engaged in their pursuits; and

WHEREAS, this spending supports over 18,220 jobs in Arizona and generates \$287 million in state and local taxes; and WHEREAS, National Hunting and Fishing Day was established in 1972 to celebrate and recognize hunters and anglers for their immense contributions to fish and wildlife conservation, and to our society.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Douglas A. Ducey, Governor of the State of Arizona, do hereby proclaim September 28, 2019, as

HUNTING AND FISHING DAY

and recognize the many and varied social, cultural, economic, and ecological benefits of our time-honored traditions of hunting and angling.

"Conserving Wildlife" License Plate Program

- In 2019, we awarded 25 License Plate Grants totaling \$128,010
- The 2019 grant awards included \$53,289 for habitat, \$32,650 for Education and \$42,070 for Youth Recruitment.
- For the first 11 months in 2019 we averaged \$13,822 per month in plate revenue, and are projecting the year end total will exceed the previous year for the 9th year in a row.
- Our April proceeds from the state were our highest monthly amount ever, \$16,400.
- From 2012-2019 we have approved 141 grants totaling \$719,300.












AZ Sportsmen for Wildlife Conservation Grant History 2012-2019 Total Approved - \$719,300 Total Utilized - \$702,794
