





The comings and goings downtown when our Legislature is in session always seems to provide us with some drama. Twists and turns are inevitable with Republicans in charge of the House and Senate, and a Democrat as our Governor. This year proved to be another interesting session. Here are the Session stats:

Bills Introduced - 1660

Memorials and Resolutions Introduced – 138

Total - 1798

Bills & Resolutions Transmitted to the Governor – 332

Signed by the Governor – 259

Vetoed by the Governor - 73

AZSFWC remains vigilant with bills and resolutions that might impact wildlife, conservation, and our public lands. There were a few controversial bills on those fronts, but as suspected they didn't gain traction, or failed. Some of the bills that failed were subsequent attempts, first introduced with a Republican Governor. They didn't pass under Ducey, so they had no chance passing with Hobbs. Four of those bills included two related to Conservation Easements, HB2021 and HB2022, and two dealing with Federal lands, HB2376 and HB2377.

They may return in 2025, but if the make up of our Legislature remains similar to the past year, chances are good the fate of those bills will likely be the same.

OHV bills were front and center this session too. AZSFWC was represented on the Senate OHV Study Committee chaired by Senator Kerr. There was a meeting in the fall of 2023, and one in early January of this year. Theoretically, this committee was going to evaluate and assess OHV issues and potentially produce proposed solutions to OHV areas of concern.

Governor Hobbs signed SB1055 on 4/2/24, extending the life of the OHV Study Committee for another year. On the surface a good thing, however Senator Kerr is termed out for the next election and the committee hasn't met in six months. Also problematic, representatives of the Federal land management agencies (BLM & FS) where OHV use and abuse is having a significant and detrimental impact were never included in the meetings.

Outside of the committee, several OHV bills took on a life of their own. The OHV Education bill, SB1567 passed and was signed by the Governor on 6/21/24. AZSFWC supported this bill as long as it included OHV renters in the education requirement. The final version did not. The bill will mandate all OHV owners view a safety video as a requirement of their OHV annual renewal. AZGFD is working with ADOT to coordinate the training and data sharing which will begin after 12/31/24.

SB1176 was going to allocate money to the County Sheriffs for OHV law enforcement. AZSFWC supported the concept, however there wasn't a viable funding mechanism. It passed the Senate but didn't get out of the House.

Then came SB1052 which was initially offered up to allow for an increase in weight in the definition of an OHV, from the current 2500 pounds to 3500 pounds. AZSFWC opposed that bill, as bigger, heavier, and more powerful OHV's would not do our public lands any favors.

SB1052 ended up morphing into not only a weight increase, but also had some conditional amendments added; a component to mitigate property damage on private land (not public land) from the OHV Recreation Fund, and additional funding for County Sheriffs for enhanced law enforcement. The additional money was going to come from increased OHV user fees through ADOT, however no recommendations on how much was included in the conditions. The bill failed with a vote in the House on 6/4/24.

AZGFD sought passage of one particular bill this session, HB2053, the publications revolving fund, which would have increased their appropriation for publications (like AZ Wildlife Views) from \$80K to \$250K. It passed almost unanimously through the House and Senate Committees, and unfortunately never got a final vote during the budget discussions.

Others on their watch list included;

SB1680, a striker requiring minors to wear helmets on OHV's, signed by the Governor 6/14/24.


SB1147, appropriating \$250K for the Livestock Loss Board to administer the Livestock Compensation Fund in FY24/25, passed the Senate, but was held in House Appropriations Committee.


